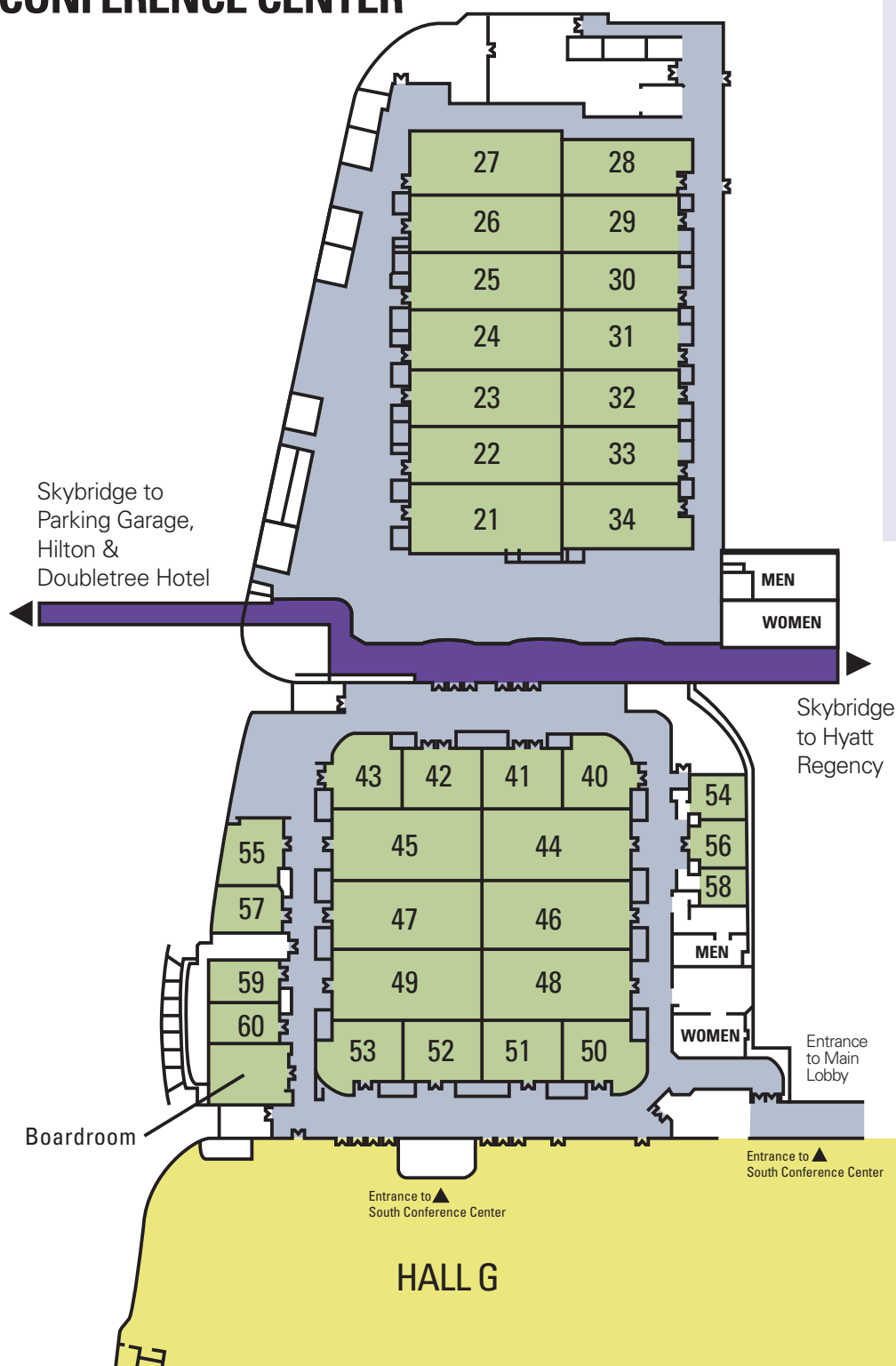

Online Courses: Platforms like Niche Academy, LinkedIn Learning, and edX provide flexible, self-paced courses on a wide range of library-related topics. Peer Networks: Connecting with other libraries and professionals through conferences, online forums, or local meetups can yield valuable recommendations for effective training. In-house Workshops: Tailor training to your library's specific needs by hosting workshops led by experienced trainers or internal staff with expertise in certain areas. The Stacks Social Club: Expanding Social Opportunities for Young Adults with Disabilities at Your Library

We all want our library storytime and program participants to feel seen, safe, and included. You probably already select picture books and music with diverse representation. But did you know there are many additional easy, evidence-based ways to structure your programs to champion belonging/inclusion, all while supporting positive social, racial, and cultural identity development, and reducing bias and stereotype formation? Switching logbooks has allowed for more participants to complete the summer reading program, proven to be more inclusive of children and adults struggling with reading, and helped parents keep track of their child's reading more easily. 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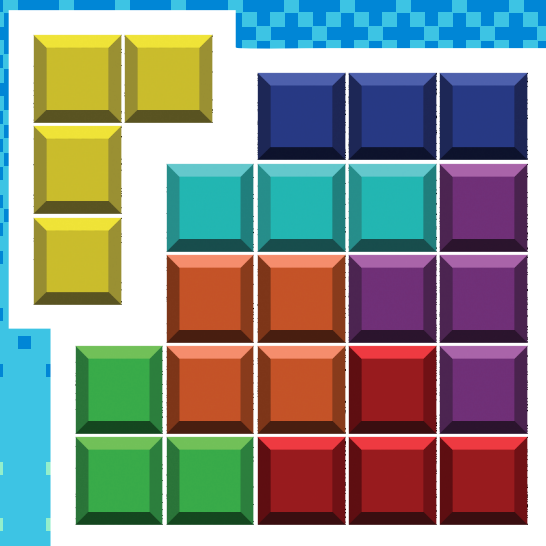
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
